

TREE OF LIFE: MERMAID

Amid a predominately polychrome forest of trees of life in ¡VIVA MÉXICO! dwells an aquatic enchantress. Surrounded by symbols of the cosmos, this mermaid, reminiscent of the legendary La Clanchana whose magical songs inspired artisans, serves as the curvilinear structure for a tree of life crafted by Herón Martinez Mendoza. Martinez Mendoza, an artist of humble origins but ultimately great artistic and commercial success, based many of his creations on legends and stories that he heard as a child. His work attracted much outside attention, and his burnished wares were the impetus for the transformation of his village, Acatlán de Osorio, into a potting community. In his lifetime, the artist produced countless trees of life, two of which are featured in ¡VIVA MÉXICO! With its graceful form, minimal tone-on-tone slip embellishment and softly glowing burnished treatment, *Tree of Life: Mermaid*, reveals a masterful hand. Serenading the school of fish to which she gave birth and other fanciful forms suggestive of seahorses, the mythical mermaid beckons and inspires the viewer just as she has the fishermen and artisans of southern Mexico throughout the ages. Zandra Rhodes' boldly colored hair is both her brand and, despite its seeming frivolity, a serious statement about the wide swath of her art, which has been characterized as dramatic, extroverted and iconic. Born in England to a mother who was a Paris fashion show fitter and art teacher, Zandra early on produced textile designs considered outrageous, complemented by an equally glamorous lifestyle. One of the new wave of London designers in the 1970s, Zandra continues to be embraced by her British counterparts, having designed for the late Princess Diana. She was named a Commander of the British Empire by the Queen in 1997 and was recently appointed Chancellor of the University of the Creative Arts in the United Kingdom. Her label has spawned an industry of designer clothing, textiles, eyewear, bed linen, shoes, furniture and Royal Doulton China sold throughout Europe and the United States as well as costumes for San Diego Opera's The Magic Flute and The Pearl Fishers and the upcoming Aida at San Francisco Opera.

Opening this October at Mingei International, ZANDRA RHODES A Lifelong Love Affair with Textiles has previously been exhibited in London, Italy, Australia, Mexico City and Los Angeles. Transcending its punk origins, her work is featured in many museum collections, among them the Victoria & Albert, New York's Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Smithsonian; she has had more than 30 solo exhibitions and is the recipient of 12 degrees, four of them honorary, as well as numerous awards including a 2003 San Diego Living Legacy Award. Zandra is also the founder of London's Fashion and Textile Museum.

Combining pop art sensibility with organic materials and nature themes, Zandra's exuberant retrospective, by her own reckoning "will be extra special because it connects with Mingei International and shows the inspiration from cultures drawn particularly from the Museum's own collections. The exhibition will be very dynamic."

Hardly abating, Zandra's fertile imagination and idiosyncratic creativity continue to flourish. She recently designed an Indian tipi set featuring a lavishly

printed tipi, rubber boots and rainwear, and a new book in the works chronicling her career from 1961 – 71 has as its appropriately droll title, Zandra Rhodes' Textile Revolution: Medals, Wiggles and Pop.

Folk Art Treasures of Romania

Romania is a country everyone has heard of, what people live within its borders and what one would

COMING EXHIBITIONS

It's a pleasure to tell you of other shows besides BETWEEN EAST AND WEST through June 2011. Opening October 3 is ZANDRA RHODES A Lifelong Love Affair with Textiles. This British designer, who lives and works half the year in the San Diego area, has been doing amazing work since the 1960s, and this retrospective will present 47 high fashion costumes she created from her distinctive printed textiles. Zandra will select textiles from a number of cultures represented in Mingei International's collection to display alongside her work, initiating a lively conversation about actual and possible influences and inspirations.

MANEKI NEKO Japan's Beckoning Cats: from Talisman to Pop Icon will showcase a recent gift to the Museum of 155 cats in porcelain, wood, lacquer, stone, metal and papier-mâché, a collection formed over 20 years by one person in avid pursuit of these whimsical creatures. The first scholarly book on this subject, written by Alan Scott Pate, is being produced and published by Mingei International.

NEW JEWELRY IN A NEW MEDIUM will feature a collection – also donated recently to the Museum by a group of collectors – of polymer clay beads and adornment. Polymer clay – a versatile plastic that is easy to handle and has the capacity to take color – has been exploited during the past 40 years by an impressive number of excellent designer craftsmen.

NAVAJO WOVEN PRAYERS 1860 – 1920, with a major book being produced and published by Mingei International, will highlight the Museum's important collection – and one private one – of wearing blankets, rugs and art squares from a period before regional styles developed fully and one not yet documented in depth. Included will be comments by Navajo weavers and tribal cultural leaders about the possible meanings woven into these great works of art.

DIRECTOR'S PICK

Among the first objects I was privileged to acquire for the collection, this Procession of the Virgin of Guadalupe was purchased in 2006 as the firstprize winner of the craft exhibition held annually in Pátzcuaro, Michoacán, to celebrate Mexico's Day of the Dead. It is a tour de force in unpainted terra cotta by Daniel de la Cruz López of Capula – a man in his 30s whom our group of Museum members was able to meet. This procession has bearers and musicians

that are all skeletons. Four women, in long robes and veiled with the narrow shawls with long fringe characteristic of Michoacán, shoulder a palanquin that carries the statue. A trellis surrounding the statue is densely covered with flowers. Two women follow closely, carrying pots of flowers, and behind them four male musicians, one with alto saxophone, another with tuba, a third with bass drum and the last with, perhaps, a noisemaker and carrying a cane on his arm. Three of the men carry great sombreros with long leather straps.

The men all wear traditional close-fitting trousers, sandals and vests over shirts with handkerchief neckties. This marvel of hand-molded and carved clay is made in such imaginative detail and so delicately that the figures, at once skeletons with fully articulated bony hands and feet, seem to have living bodies beneath their clothing and creases and folds in their clothing

Community Center Outreach

Funding from the James Irvine Foundation is enabling Mingei International to offer participatory art projects connected with current exhibitions to the communities surrounding the Joan and Vi Jacobs Center at Market Street Plaza and Bayside Community Center in Linda Vista. Like the Museum's successful school outreach program funded by the Akaloa Resource Foundation, the Community Center Outreach Program, also called **ART OF THE PEOPLE**, aims to bring the Museum experience to residents in their communities while creating a more welcoming atmosphere for them when they visit the Museum.

Initial stages of the program have been devoted to discussions between the Museum and the community centers to establish guidelines that ensure that the needs of the areas' residents will be met. Beginning in September, nine six-week sessions per center will be conducted, ending in December 2011. Each session will begin with a Museum visit and end with an evening at the community center devoted to an exhibition of participants' completed works. In addition to integrating the Museum into these communities, the innovative program promotes crosscultural exchanges within each community. This initiative also fosters intergenerational relationships, offering classes geared toward audiences of a variety of ages and backgrounds.

New Acquisitions



The Museum has added to its rich collection of Japanese folk art a finely crafted Meiji Period, polychromed wood kanban, or signboard. A kanban, more than simply a sign, can be likened to a family crest, created to honor the soul of the business it represents and to bring respect to its owners. Generously given by Maurice M. Kawashima, this kanban depicts the lively, smiling Okame, goddess of mirth, with carved character writing that reads, "Ishikawa Sake Shop, beautifully blended pure sake made by Otuma Winery." Kawashima has also donated an exquisite teahouse sign. Both are stunning examples of Japanese craftsmanship and excellent additions to the Museum's collection.

In honor of Michael Mansfield, longtime Museum member and volunteer, Robert M. Cerello has donated a superior collection of folk art from various cultures. Many of the objects are from diverse regions of Mexico and range in subject matter from papier-mâché skeletons to clay molded religious processional figures.

Purchases of interest include a group of three baskets, two from Botswana, and the third from Japan. The contemporary Botswana pieces are delicately woven with palm fronds and grass, in rich yet muted color patterns. The origin of the Japanese basket, used for kimono storage, dates to the early twentieth century and is elegantly woven of bamboo.

Indonesian Trunk Show in The Collectors' Gallery


